traveled faster: two-three miles per hour (speed limit was four). You'd travel 15 miles per day, stopping occasionally to go through a lock that would raise or lower the boat. There were even aqueducts, where the canal traversed OVER a creek or river. Canals were an incredible feat of engineering.
